Well, never fear, do the following:

1. Boot in DOS with BASIC in. 2. In the immediate mode, type POKE 4148,234:POKE 4149,234. 3. Now LOAD your program, either from BASIC or from DOS.

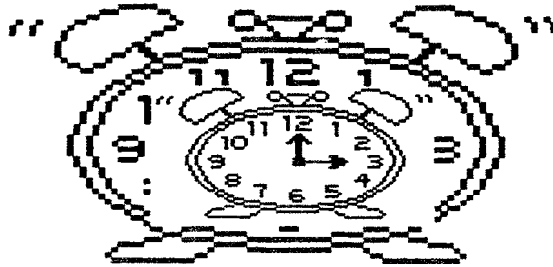
You won't get ERROR 164 now. And, you can fix that garbled program.

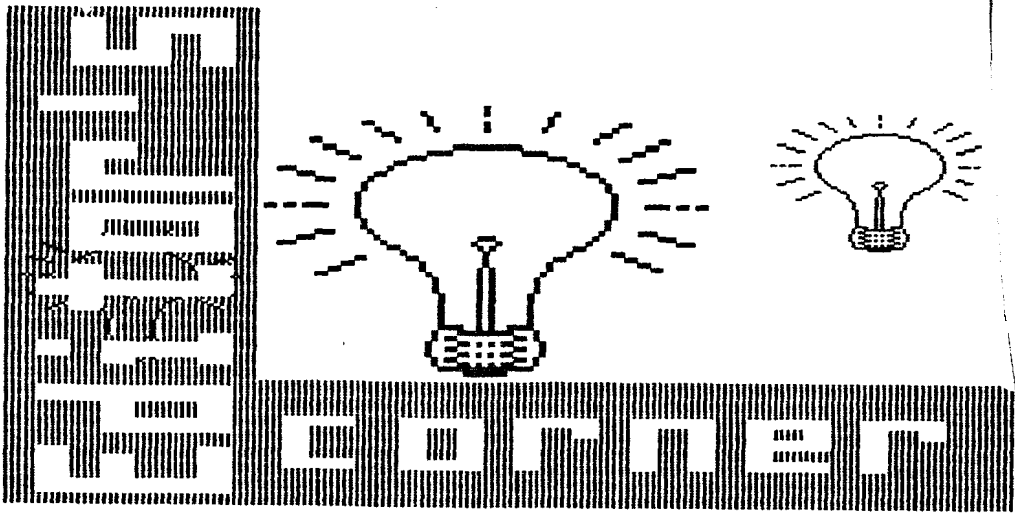

I solved the latter problem by using Brad Jaworski's schematic drawing to assemble the components purchased at Radio Shack. The printer was replaced with a well used, 1027 that Mark Heuston parted with for \$50. That printer in turn did its job well until the letters wore out at which point I mated the brains from Mark's with the brawn of my original 1027. A month ago, disaster--- I broke a small plastic component of the print wheel gear. To conclude this portion of the saga, Brad now has two "handyman special" 1027s. He's going to try to Phoenix them for his Dad. By the way Brad, why don't you bring Pop to the next meeting?

I was desperate for a printer. I had a deadline for producing my monthly financial report to the Board of the Cold Spring Harbor Fish Hatchery (of which I am Treasurer). I called Alex Pignato - a fountain of wisdom - who aimed me at a Star NX1000. He also suggested a call to Kris Holtegaard, resident expert on connectors.

LAEELMASTER allows you to create and edit data onscreen. You design your label in a 6 line by 34 character area. Compatible with any DOS. Written in machine language, which makes this program a powerful one for the serious Atari user.

MULTI-COLUMN LISTER Another machine language program which interfaces with LABELMASTER. This program lets you print one to six across labels. Using the Printer Driver Editor makes this program compatible with any printer. SpartaDos user5 can print out by Sub-Directory or Sub-Directories from A-Z. You make also view a disk dir. and set the number of lines between labels from the main menu. A must program for the mailing list users. Both programs LABELMASTER & MULTI-COLUMN LISTER are a steal at \$10.00. (NOT EACH BUT BOTH FOR TEN)

THE SMALL BUSINESS SYSTEM A group of programs that allow small business owners to run his business on a Atari computer. The following is a break down of what is included in this package. INVOICE & PURCHASE ORDER, EXPENSE REPORTS, PROFIT AND LOSS REPORTS, SALES & TAX REPORTS, CHARTS OF ACCOUNTS, INCOME ENTRY (from sales, saving accounts etc,) EXPENSE ENTRY (business expenses) INVENTORY PROGRAM(report generating functions) COMPANY SETUP. You can use SBS to manage building rental income and expenses, keep your own personal income and expenses records. Reports can be generated by month, any consecutive group of months or by the year. The invoice program generates very professional looking results. I myself use this program for a small

REVIEW OF A+ FRENCH

Gadgets & Games, Roosevelt Field \$9.95

A recent trip to Morocco made me realize that English is not enough as a language that one speaks. As a former French colony, Morocco uses Arabic and French as their official language, and that didn't help me. Upon return to the good old US of A I decided to learn French the easy way, with my 130 XE. So I went out to Gadgets & Games and located among the Commodore shelves (Yes you will find ATARI programs there, Commodore one side, ATARI on the other side!) A+ French by American Educational Computer Inc. for the 800XL/1200XL. Home I went, full of excitement, to learn French. Needless to say that I had absolutely no knowledge of the French language, I booted the disk according to instructions and everything worked fine. By the way, the instruction manual is clear and precise. It advises that on the 800 XL and the 130 XE a double return press is needed. Reason: the disk boots and then stops, a double return press continues the booting process. Once you are on, you are presented with a menu of 35 lessons @ 10 words each. After selecting a lesson by number you then go to another screen. This screen is more like a "Hangman" style operation. A sentence or a word is displayed in English, you type in the French word. You have several tries before the French word is displayed. Now you go on to the next word and so forth until you finish this entire lesson. After finishing a lesson a score screen is displayed, showing % of success and a rank (Novice etc. 1. If your % is too low, you should do the lesson over again. Words within a

lesson are chosen by the computer at random, meaning that when you do the lesson over question # 1 will not be # 1 any more, thus keeping you on your toes. When you finish a lesson successfully, you then have a choice to play a maze game (I guess to keep your mind off things.) or return to the menu for another lesson. There is room for creating your own lessons as well as a printer feature to print out your lessons and responses. The graphics are great and the program is excellent. As far as learning French is concerned, it takes a lot more than this program to learn French. I see it as a valuable tool in addition to classroom work (As they rightfully advertised) As a footnote I would like to add that you are to send in a warranty card and sign a license agreement on that card. It also tells you that for \$ 3.00 handling and shipping you could get a free disk of your choosing from their catalog (13 titles). I choose WORLD HISTORY and sent them \$ 3.00. Within 10 days my free disk arrived. Its nice to know that a little known company stands behind their word. (World History will be reviewed separately at another time!)

BASICALLY WHAT THIS PROGRAM DOES IS TO ALLOW YOU TO LOAD 1 TO 4 'SKETCH PAD' ICONS (OR A RUBBER STAMP SCREEN) AND DO WONDEROUS THINGS WITH IT/THEM. YOU CAN USE THE TEXT EDITOR TO:

1 - ADD TEXT TO THE ICONS IN ANY FONT OF THE TYPE YOU ALREADY USE FOR OTHER PROGRAMS (YOU KNOW, THE 9 SECTOR ONES).

2 - NOT ONLY CAN YOU PUT THE TEXT 'ANYWHERE' ON THE SCREEN, BUT YOU CAN USE HEIGHT FROM 1-8 AND WIDTHS OF 1-4.

3 - IF THATS NOT ENOUGH TO WET YOUR APPETITE, HOW ABOUT USING NOT DIFFERENT FONTS ON THE SAME SCREEN, BUT EVEN ON THE SAME LINE!

4 - ITALICIZE ANY PORTION OF THE TEXT OR PUT SLICES IN IT LIKE THE IBM LOGO.

5 - HOW ABOUT ROTATING THE TEXT 90, 180 OR 270 DEGREES?

IF THATS NOT ENOUGH, WITH THE GRAPHICS EDITOR YOU CAN:

1 - SHRINK, EXPAND, COPY OR JUST MOVE ANY 1, 2 OR ALL 4 PADS.

ONE THING ■ DO WITH RUBBER STAMP IS TO CREATE RETURN ADDRESS LABELS FOR ME AND MY FRIENDS. FIRST YOU NEED TO PURCHASE SOME 2 1/2" BY 15/16" LABELS. ■ GET MINE FROM 'FORMS FOR YOU'. NEXT, YOU NEED TO SELECT THE

PRINT SHOP ICON YOU WANT TO USE (YOU COULD USE MORE THAN ONE, BUT IT WOULD BE TACKY) AND USE THE 'CONVERT ICON' FUNCTION OF RUBBER STAMP TO CONVERT IT FOR USE WITH RUBBER STAMP. OH! OH! I FORGOT MENTION THAT RUBBER STAMP ALSO HAS OPTIONS TO CONVERT PRINT SHOP ICONS AND TO CREATE 16X16 FONTS TOO. ANYWAYS, BACK TO THE RETURN ADDRESS LABELS. RELOAD RUBBER STAMP AND LOAD YOUR ICON WITH THE SKETCH PAD LOAD OPTION. I LOAD MINE TO <U>PPER <L>EFT QUADRANT. NOW YOU WANT TO LOAD THE CHARACTER SET (OR FONT!) YOU WANT TO USE. GO TO THE TEXT EDITOR AND TYPE YOUR NAME AND ADDRESS LINES APPROPRIATELY. LASTLY, BUT MOST IMPORTANT, SELECT THE PRINT OPTION, LABELS AND HOW MANY YOU WANT (1-99). THE SPACING COMES OUT PERFECTLY AND THEY AREN'T TOO LARGE OR TOO SMALL. I LIKE TO PRINT ONLY 20 OR 30 AT A TIME AND HAVE LOTS OF VARIETY! I'M SURE YOU CAN FIND MANY OTHER USES FOR THIS OUTSTANDING PROGRAM. IF RUBBER STAMP ISN'T ALL YOU NEED. CHECK INTO TYPESETTER, PAGE DESIGNER AND MEGAFONT II+, ALL FROM XLENT SOFTWARE. THATS ALL FOR THIS MONTH. HOPE TO HEAR FROM SOME OF YOU ALL SOON. WRITE TO:

TextPro: A Series of Copyrighted 8-Bit
Shareware Word Processors from Mike
Collins and Ronnie Riche

If you have need of a Word Processor
that will run without displacing your
R: Handler, TextPro 3.2r (and 2.5r for
AtariDOS fans) is about your best bet.

If you have ever used SpeedScript, the
appearance of the Disk Menu and the
general "feel" of the program will
contain no surprises other than cursor
movement options. You will, however,
have a lot more flexibility than
SpeedScript Ever provided (at least,
more than I ever noticed).

Both versions assemble at \$2800,
allowing you room for RS232 handlers
or other special handlers to remain in
RAM. The nice thing about this is, you
can use a "persistent" handler without
having to reboot every time you switch
applications, as long as the handler
is not directly appended to your
program. That way you never run into
the "Not Enough Memory" message
because of the handler reloading on
top of itself, and taking up more
memory.

Some Features of TextPro Includes

- > Binary Load, to switch to other
binary programs:
- > English Error Messages instead of
numbers:
- > SpartaDOS Subdirectory support:
- > Automatic Directory Sorting;
- > Exit directly to BASIC and return;

--> Ability to create a Disk Log of
all
your disks, with any comments you
want added (usage notes or
whatever, you have the entire word
processor options available
instead
of somebody else's idea of what
constitutes a software
listing.. .);

--> Several "/" parameters to let you
Save to Cursor, Load From Cursor,
Append, and several useful others;

--> User-definable Macros and Macro
definitions, to let you automate
repetitive keystrokes that *you*
make often. There are some already
written on the pay services, among
them a virtual 10 file windowing
utility you can use from a
RAMDisk.

One I wrote for myself let me walk
away from a rather long file I had
downloaded. while the Macro
deleted
multiple characters (text AND
Control characters) that I did not
need cluttering up the
file--having
a dot-matrix printer I don't need
to backspace and retype a
character
4 to 8 times to get Boldface or
Enhanced script--so I didn't have
to wear out my eyes or fingers
typing in character sequences to
replace with other character
sequences using the Global Replace
feature. The Macro did the
donkey-work? and I had a cup of
coffee!

Utility of the Programs

TextPro x.xr versions are limited to a
text window of 15,360 characters
(about 6 full pages of 64-column
text), but using the "Save to Cursor",
"Delete to Top", "Load to Cursor", and
"/A" appended Save and Print

parameters you can work with files of virtually any size. Also, you can write your own Macro to handle this for you or use SEGMENT.MAC from the pay services to automate it.

Files are saved and printed in ASCII format, which allows you to interchange text files with people having other computers (like the ST folks).

The Files Menu gives you a listing of files, number of free sectors, and Delete, Lock, Unlock, Rename, Format, Load, Copy, and eXit (to DOS) along with Drive Select 1-8 and Subdirectory changes (if you have SpartaDOS).

Formatting changes (margin resets, pitch changes, font changes, underlining, etc.) are done with imbedded commands. Several are predefined, you can define some of your own, or you can imbed printer control code; specific to your printer for "fancy" work.

Using the Macros you can automate just about any function--the limit is your own imagination--giving you the freedom to perform files maintenance without having to go to the Menu, for instance.

In all, TextPro is about as useful a Word Processor as any I have ever seen for the 3-bit Atari. It is easy enough to use that my wife (who knows *nothing* about the internal workings of a computer) has no problems writing her papers on it just using the built-in commands; yet for someone who likes to make things work the way *they* like them to work, TextPro offers extreme versatility with a minimum of effort. It can do everything I have seen commercial Word Processors do (with the possible exception of printing only odd or even pages), and at a Shareware price of \$10 to \$20, nothing that is as good comes anywhere near the value.

Different Versions

TextPro 1.2 is intended for use with AtariDOS, but there are extensions available that allow you some other choices. Using the available extensions allow you a great deal of flexibility in text handling, and same degree of automation. What is not available from the extensions can be built to your satisfaction using the Macro feature.

Version 2.5r is meant for AtariDOS.

Version 3.2r is meant for SpartaDOS II,

x.xr versions will not recognize the EXTension files for v1.2, but the Macros can be used to overcome any disadvantage there.

Conclusion

Mike Collins and Ronnie Riche have done an excellent continuing job with all of the TextPro series. If I *knew* all of the features available, this review could easily turn into a monster! (This was supposed to be a *short* review.. .)

I recommend TextPro very highly. Get a copy, try it out, and if you like it (as I'm sure you will); support the ShareWare concept in the most tangible way there is: Pay the developers!

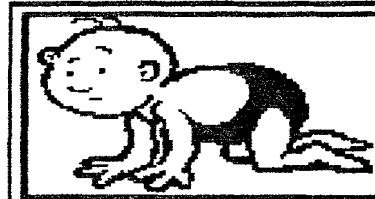
BOARD REPORT

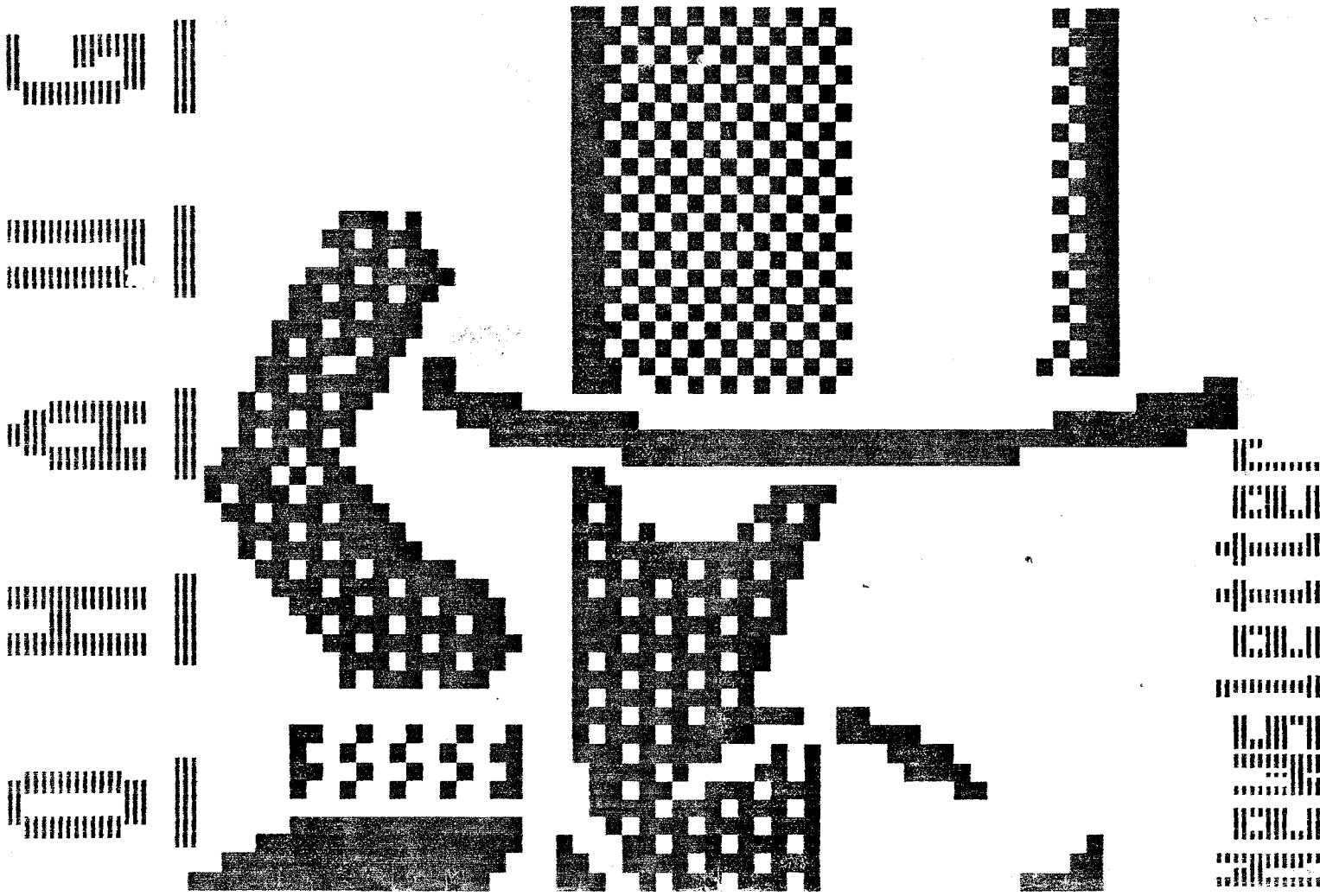
